Ted was a foundation member of the Friends of Scotchmans Creek which formed in March 1998. Over the following years, Ted played a vital role in developing the group, through its amalgamation with the Friends of Valley Reserve to its increasing role in representing the interests of Valley Reserve and the Scotchmans Creek corridor both to the City of Monash and the wider community. Ted was a committee member for many years and played a significant role in all the activities of the group.

For the diary - 2016

With the welcome rain that we have had the planting is easy. In June we had a very successful Friends planting in Valley Reserve. Eight volunteers planted 800 plants by the side of the main track to the west from the amenities block. We have used Friends' funds to pay for these plants as we did last year. We would like to repeat this venture next year.

We had our first planting using Melbourne Water grant funds on Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> July. United Energy sent 20 employees to Regent Street to plant 2000 plants beside Scotchmans Creek. The group started early at 8 am and all the work was completed by 9:30 am. There was a great variety of plants from tough lomandras and dianellas to larger understorey plants.

This is an area that is difficult for the native plants as the remaining willows still shade out the area and brush the ground with their drooping branches.

On Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> July our second planting using Melbourne Water grant funds will take place at Crosby Drive with staff from the Novotel Group coming along to provide most of the labour. Novotel also provide us all with a sausage sizzle after the work is done. We appreciate the support of these local businesses with our planting programs. Often the staff give up time on their days off to come and help us.

Finally do not forget National Tree Day on Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> July when we will be planting 8,000 plants in Fairway Reserve. Page 2 July 2016

#### May

The creeks were flowing clear and more strongly than usual, except Valley Ck (site 3) was flowing very slowly and slightly cloudy. However Valley Ck produced much the better invertebrates sample, obtaining a Good rating, and frogs were heard calling (probably common froglet or southern brown tree frog (both common in SE suburbs)).

Most of the water quality indicators were Fair to Excellent, except for: Poor turbidity in the Crosby Arm (site 1b, Glen Waverley Main Drain) and in Valley Ck (but note the invertebrates result).

Poor ammonium and phosphorus results at site 2 (Scotchmans Ck at Regent St).

#### June

The water chemistry was typical of these sites, with Fair to Excellent ratings except for

Poor conductivity and turbidity at site 1a (Scotchmans Ck, upstream)
Poor turbidity downstream (sites 2 and 3, Scotchmans Ck and Valley Ck)

Poor phosphorus rating at the sites measured (1a, 1b, the upstream sites))

Habitat has changed slightly in the last few years.

At site 1a, sand dredging for flood safety also removed the instream vegetation. The banks are weedy, the verge vegetation is improving. At site 1b we have lowered the scores for Verge Vegetation, Instream Cover, and Erosion & Stability.

At site 4 (in the wetlands) we have increased our scores for in-stream and bank vegetation.
